We prioritize funding and support for entrepreneurs who represent communities that have been marginalized due to race, ethnicity, and/or gender. Our goal is to help them prepare for and secure investment that will help their businesses grow and thrive.



Who We Support

Michigan Good Food Fund works with food and farm businesses across our state's value chain, from growers to food retailers and anyone in between. While most of the businesses we assist have been operating for at least one year, we do sometimes include earlier-stage businesses run by entrepreneurs with industry experience, or entrepreneurs who have contributed their own funds to their startup budget.

Flexible Financing

Our statewide lending network develops creative solutions and a wide range of loans to support food and farm business through each phase of growth. Loans range from \$2,500 to \$6,000,000. Loan rates start as low as 4%.



Tailored Business Assistance

Our network of food industry experts offers connections and one-on-one consulting to support businesses that do not yet qualify for financing. We also host periodic workshops tailored to select geographies or food business sectors.
